II. Reports:

a. Update from Office of Student Conduct

- Laura Bruner and Harry Linden provided an update from the Office of Student Conduct (OoSC).
- Contact information for the Office of Student Conduct: 780-633-3422 and <u>studentconduct@macewan.ca</u>
- They are there to help build support and community at MacEwan by upholding MacEwan's policies.

Adopted

- Their goal is to ensure a fair, transparent, and reasonable process for all that are involved. They act as a complaint intake centre, and the main intent is not to punish.
- Faculty members should note that if there is an emergency, both the security emergency line 780-497-5555 AND 911 should be called. 911 dispatchers will connect with campus security for location details. The Safe@MacEwan app also has phone numbers. The non-emergency line is 780-497-5554.
- Concerns with student conduct should be reported to the Department Chair, as well as OoSC. Informal files are kept for cases that do not progress further.
- Academic integrity issues will go to Paul Sopcak.
- Student Conduct and Student of Concern are different:
 - Student of Concern is involved if there are concerns about the student's well-being. Student support coordinators refer students to on-campus and off-campus resources.
 - Student conduct is if a student is in breach of policy.
 - Often, both are connected to ensure required supports are available.
- OoSC is available for consultation, and intake forms are available through the HelpCentre. Upon request, OoSC can complete the form on behalf of the faculty member.
- Anonymity: It is challenging to conduct a full investigation if anonymity is desired. Should a student wish to keep anonymity, they should file the complaint via the Confidence Line.
- The support exists so faculty can focus on classroom management, contact them sooner rather than later. Initiating contact does not mean formal steps are taken.
- If ADR needs to be involved, contact them first. However, OoSC can work with the Learning Specialists to ensure the appropriate action is taken. Sometimes, rules are misunderstood by ADR students, and early resolution is a good opportunity to check that students understand where the boundary is.

b. Dean's Report

- We are nearing the end of the hiring season and currently have 15 newly signed faculty members, 21 sessional-extendeds, and one more limited-term appointment is ongoing.
- APQA approved the interdisciplinary minor in Cybersecurity, which will be available starting Fall 2025.
- The Post-Baccalaureate Certificate in Behaviour Analysis will be the first of its kind at MacEwan, and Arts and Science graduates will have access to it.
- The Environmental Sciences Major is out for external review, and Data Science is expected to go for review by the end of June.

- Classes are mostly taught by sessional faculty who are certified, but a tenuretrack faculty member with the required expertise will likely be hired.
- The Psychology Department is responsible for determining what resources are required.
- Courses can also be used to fulfill current students' degree requirements, but most students who access this program will have a Baccalaureate degree already. No additional stress on Psychology enrolment is expected. Most of the he courses are already offered by the School of Continuing Education, and seats are already being held for it.
