IMPORTANT PLANNING NOTES

1. A student's 6CR in a Language other than English can be used to fulfill half of the 12CR Language and Literacy core requirements of the Bachelor of Arts degree. The Language other than English credits can also be used to meet the International Content exit requirement for the BA degree. Exit requirements are the only time a student can use a course as duplicate credit.
2. Junior-level HIST and CLAS courses can be used to satisfy the Humanities core requirement of a Bachelor of Arts degree.
3. Students majoring in History are not required to take junior-level HIST or CLAS courses as part of their degree, though they are encouraged to do so. Students are required to research and meet the prerequisites for every senior-level HIST course they take as part of their degree.
4. See below for a listing of History courses offered at MacEwan University. Please keep in mind that course offerings will vary from academic year to academic year. Student may address questions about planned course offerings to the History discipline chair or the Faculty of Arts and Science Program Services Office.
5. With permission from the History department, students may use up to 6CR from CLAS 314 and 315 to satisfy the General Requirements of their major. (CLAS 310, 311, 312 and 313 are no longer offered, but may also satisfy this requirement with permission of the History department.)
