

Getting career-ready requires more than just lecture-based learning. You can expect a well-rounded education, with opportunities for hands-on learning directly in your field of study. Some programs may have specific requirements for types of experiential learning, or you may be able to choose which options work best for you.

Work-integrated learning

Combine your academic studies with real-world application in a workplace or practice setting. This requires a partnership between MacEwan, a student and a host organization where students are able to gain experience. Depending on your program, that experience could take place in settings including classrooms, offices, labs, hospitals and more.

Internships

Gain workplace experience and academic credits in a supervised, structured environment.

Practicums

Learn under an experienced, licensed professional in order to gain hands-on skills for your own certification.

Field placements

Gain skills in a short-term placement in a real work environment relevant to your program.

Community-engaged learning

Build relationships, conduct research and solve real problems while working with community organizations here in Edmonton.

Co-operative education (Bachelor of Commerce)

Spend a term (or more) working directly in your field in a paid placement.

Education abroad

Broaden your horizons as you complete your education or build your skill set. Education Abroad can help you expand your academic, personal and professional experience through exchanges, internships and summer programs. Go for a summer, a term or a year – find a timeline and destination that work for you!

Expand your understanding of key societal issues and find solutions to real problems.

MacEwan is a national leader in undergraduate research. Many of our faculties and schools are home to facilities dedicated to hands-on learning opportunities, and our expert faculty use them in their pursuit of information and answers. Students are able to work alongside their professors in research capacities, and even pursue their own research independently – an opportunity not offered at most undergrad universities.

Those students are invited to present at **Student Research Day** each year, where they give an oral or poster presentation detailing their work. From scientific experiments to art creations to community-based scholarship, these students are trendsetters and trend breakers, pursuing

new hypotheses and asking important questions. Students can also publish their findings in the **MacEwan University Student eJournal** (*MUSe*).

The Office of Research Services offers workshops to equip you with everything you need to start your research project. MacEwan's Undergraduate Student Research Initiative (USRI) also provides grants to students looking to pursue their own research in their academic field. They can help you apply for external research awards and research studentships, both provincially and federally.

Several of our faculty are featured each year in the *Report on Scholarship*, showcasing their latest projects or major findings. And our students are just as accomplished, winning awards for researching everything from the dark side of online communities to developing antibiotics for drug-resistant bacteria species.





It was very cool to be able to work on this project. As a graduate of the school's design program in 2006 and playing on the men's hockey team, you could say I started this project 22 years ago.



Cost breakdown

The cost of your education will vary based on your program of study. Additional costs like textbooks and tech necessary for your coursework – as well as the cost of living – should be considered when planning your finances.

Your tuition and student fees already cover a few expenses, like a U-Pass for transit and a pass to MacEwan Sport and Wellness. For a breakdown of your MacEwan-related fees and costs specific to your program, head to *MacEwan.ca/TuitionFees*.

How to apply

Ready to find yourself at MacEwan? Take the first steps toward your educational goals.

Choose a program (or two)

Find the area of study that most interests you. It's a good idea to select a second program to include in your application in case your first choice is full.

Review requirements and deadlines

Check for admission requirements for your program of choice, and ensure you meet them. Some programs may have additional requirements, like auditions or portfolio submissions. Then, look at admission deadlines to ensure you apply in time for your desired start date.

Talk to a recruiter

International recruiters will help you make a plan for your application and arrival in Edmonton. They're here to answer any questions you might have about the process.

Submit your application

Apply for your program online. You'll receive a myMacEwan email, which will be used to provide you with further information or questions about your application. Be sure to check it often. You can also track your application progress through <u>myPortal.MacEwan.ca</u> using your student email address.

Submit transcripts and documents

Document requirements vary by country, so check online to see what you will need to submit for academic records.

Complete the process

Monitor your to-do list in the myStudentSystem portal for any changes or new requests. You may need to complete additional admission criteria. Once you've been accepted, you will need to accept or decline your offer of admission. Then, just pay your admission confirmation deposit to secure your spot in your program.

University terms to know

Classification of Instructional Program (CIP) code

CIP codes classify post-secondary education programs by field of study in Canada. All bachelor degrees are Post-graduation Work Permit (PGWP) eligible, regardless of field of study. Diplomas and certificates must have a CIP code on the IRCC's PGWP field of study list to be PGWP eligible. MacEwan's CIP codes are available on the MacEwan International webpage.

Competitive admission

Admission is considered competitive in programs where the number of qualified applicants regularly exceeds the number of seats available.

Co-op work permit

A co-op work permit allows you to participate in work-integrated learning that is a mandatory component of your study program. If your program has a work-integrated learning component, such as a practicum, clinical practice, field placement or co-op, you require a co-op work permit in addition to your study permit. You will receive additional documents when accepted if you need to apply for a co-op work permit together with your study permit.

Early admission

MacEwan offers early admission to qualified applicants prior to the completion of their program's academic requirements. Applications will be evaluated based on final Grade 11 and/ or Grade 12 courses and the other admission requirements. Specific requirements are located at *MacEwan.ca/EarlyAdmission*.

Major

In some programs, students choose a major – a particular area of study to focus on during their degree (e.g., in the Bachelor of Arts program, you might major in Anthropology or English, while in the Bachelor of Commerce, you might choose Marketing or International Business). Some programs do not have majors (e.g., Bachelor of Science in Nursing).

Minor

Most programs that have majors often also have minors – a secondary area of focus. For example, a Bachelor of Arts student might major in Psychology and minor in Sociology.

Offer of admission

An offer of admission means you have been admitted to your program of choice. After you receive an offer of admission or conditional admission, you need to accept or decline your offer.

Provincial Attestation Letter (PAL)

A PAL is a letter provided by the province where you plan to study. It confirms that you have been assigned one of the available spaces to study in that province. The university requests a PAL on your behalf and will send you the letter shortly after your admission.

Rank list / wait list

If you do not meet the current competitive admission criteria, you may be placed on a rank list. In the event that the competitive average, admission grade point average or score changes, you may be offered a spot. If you are admissible but there are no seats available in your program, you may be offered a place on a wait list.

Study permit

A study permit allows international students to study while in Canada. You can apply to Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada for a study permit once you are offered admission to the university and before you come to Canada.

Term

The periods of instruction into which the academic year is usually divided: Fall, Winter and Spring/Summer. The term dates are published in the Academic Schedule.

Frequently asked questions

Does MacEwan University provide advice on course and program planning?

Yes, our Academic Advising Centre provides support with program selection, course planning and understanding academic requirements, including transfer credits.

What is considered full-time student status?

A student is considered full-time if they are enrolled in nine or more credits per term – typically three courses. Some programs require students to take 15 to 18 credits each term. Talk to a recruiter or academic advisor to find out how many courses you will need to take each term in your program.

Can I take a double major or minor?

Yes, you can pursue two different fields of study within a single degree program. You would fulfill the course requirements and earn a bachelor's degree with two listed majors, rather than two separate degrees.

You can also pursue a single major alongside two separate minors, letting you explore and develop knowledge in two different areas beyond your primary major.

Am I able to apply to more than one program?

Yes. If you're interested in more than one program, you can indicate a first and second choice on your application.

Are entrance scholarships available?

We have entrance scholarships for degree and diploma programs. See if you're eligible here.



What is the difference between conditional admission and full admission?

Conditional admission means certain requirements that need to be completed by a specified deadline are still outstanding. This can include academic requirements like submitting final transcripts or non-academic requirements like paying an admission confirmation deposit. Full admission means that all admission requirements have been met, and the acceptance is guaranteed.

Apart from tuition, what additional fees may apply, and where can I find more information about them?

The cost of textbooks will vary depending on your courses and instructor. There are also a few mandatory fees that are included in your total cost that allow you to access campus services. Learn more about those here.



When should I apply?

Earlier is always better. Applications for Fall 2026 open October 1, 2025. Depending on the program – and term – you're applying for, application deadlines vary. Learn more here.
