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DIPLOMA REGULATIONS

Successful completion of a General Studies diploma requires 60 credits of non-duplicative coursework with an overall grade point average (GPA) of 2.0/4.0. Additionally,

- All courses taken to satisfy certificate and diploma requirements must have a minimum value of 3 credits.
- With approval from the Dean of Arts and Science (or his designate), students may be permitted to use courses other than those listed satisfy the course and discipline requirements listed above.
- The minimum passing grade for a course at MacEwan is a D unless otherwise noted next to the appropriate course in the program of study.
